The Abbotsford School District expects all students to conduct themselves in a manner worthy of the respect of others:

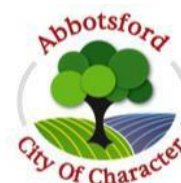
- Be honest and forthright.

**SILVER** represents the lining of a cloud where a raven flies. The “silver lining” provides comfort, protection, and an inspiration for the future.

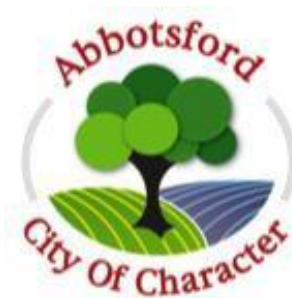
**RED** and **WHITE** represent two important ideals:

## **Our Founder, Dr. Eugene Reimer**



Our school proudly displays the name of a Canadian hero, Eugene Reimer. Eugene Reimer's story, his commitment to service, unwavering positive attitude, and his passion for enabling others to set goals and realize their potential is a compass for the staff and students at Eugene Reimer Middle School.

Eugene Reimer's significant contributions to sports and to athletes with a disability are unparalleled. An inspiration to thousands of disabled individuals, Eugene has proven that a wheelchair is not a handicap, but rather, an opportunity for athletic achievement.

Following a childhood bout with polio, the longtime Abbotsford resident was left with only minimal use of his legs. In the 1960s, however, when wheelchair sports were in their infancy, Eugene took on sport with a passion. He excelled in a wide variety of games, including weightlifting, archery, swimming, basketball, volleyball, and track and field events. Eugene quickly became one of the province's top all-around athletes.

From 1968, until his retirement from sports in 1980, Eugene amassed over 50 national and 22 international medals, 10 of which were Olympic! He participated and excelled in prestigious world events, such as the International Paralympics, PanAm Wheelchair Games, and B.C. Wheelchair Games. In 1972, Eugene set new world records at the Paralympic Games in Heidelberg, Germany, by taking gold medals in both discus and pentathlon, and a silver medal for the 4 x 60 m relay.



Eugene was named "Canadian Outstanding Male Athlete of the Year" in 1972, the first time that such a level of recognition had been awarded to an athlete with a disability. In 1974, he was awarded the Order of Canada medal for his "inspiring example to the handicapped". In 1991, the B.C. Sports Hall of Fame and Museum presented Eugene with the W.A.C. Bennett Award, in recognition of his special contribution to the Province of B.C. In 2000, Eugene was inducted into the Terry Fox Hall of Fame. Later that same year the Eugene Reimer Award was established.

This award is presented annually and recognizes a British Columbian who makes an outstanding contribution in the field of sport, recreation, or physical education for persons with disabilities. Abbotsford's own Eugene Reimer was honoured as the inaugural recipient. On May 2nd, 2002, Eugene was inducted into the B. C. Sports Hall of Fame.

A valued ambassador for people with physical disabilities, Mr. Reimer chaired the 2002 BC Disability Games held in Abbotsford.

In nominating Mr. Reimer for this honour, renowned British Columbian Rick Hansen notes, "Eugene was an incredible inspiration to me as a young athlete and he continues to inspire all who know him and/or his story." Board Chairman, John Smith, adds, "Eugene Reimer is a highly distinguished Abbotsford Native whose courage, dedication and many achievements are an excellent model for the youth of our community, and particularly those attending the school that will bear his name."



# ERMS CODE OF CONDUCT

## **Statement of Purpose**

The ERMS Code of Conduct serves as a guide for all members of our learning community. It is designed to promote a healthy, safe, caring environment for students of all abilities to learn. We value diversity and equality in our building and always strive for a learning environment free from discrimination as stated in the Human Rights Code.

## **Conduct Expectations**

Eugene Reimer Middle School students are expected to always demonstrate character traits while at school in all settings, and when off campus representing our school on field trips, at sports events and extra-curricular activities.

## **Rising Expectations**

As students mature, they can expect to be presented with more opportunities to demonstrate responsibility in our building. As such, they will become leaders in the school community. They will develop leadership skills and recognize the value they present as role models to younger students and community partners.

As students get older and become more aware of personal responsibility, they will also understand the need for increasing consequences for inappropriate behaviour.

## **Acceptable Conduct**

Students are expected to conform to high standards of behaviour when at school, on the way to and from school, and while attending any school function or field trip. Students should strive towards—but are not limited to the following behaviours:

- Demonstrating exemplary character traits
- Respecting the rights of members of the ERMS community
- Promoting an environment of understanding & mutual respect
- Working to the best of their abilities
- Being honest and forthright
- Caring for each other
- Leaving a situation better than it was found
- Becoming an expert at something
- Representing ERMS positively at all times

## **Consequences**

Violations to the ERMS Code of Conduct will result in consistent and fair disciplinary action. The development of self-discipline is an important goal at our school. The goal of the disciplinary action is for students to learn from their mistakes and be restorative rather than punitive. The violation will be dealt with on an individual basis. The severity and frequency of the violation and the age, maturity, and needs of the student will be considered when determining appropriate action.

## **Harassment & Bullying**

Harassment or Bullying is against the District Code of Conduct and will be dealt with severely and quickly. Harassment or bullying is inappropriate remarks, jokes, taunting, comments, gestures, sexually suggestive comments, or actions that create an uncomfortable environment.

A Bully is someone who:

- uses power to hurt others or harm their possessions;
- purposely scares or intimidates others;



- often hurts the same person repeatedly;
- is sometimes supported by other people who just watch and laugh, instead of helping the person being bullied.

If a student feels s/he is being harassed or bullied, he or should:

- tell the person to stop
- tell a parent/guardian, teacher, or another adult with whom you feel comfortable discussing the issue
- try to stay away from places or times they might be alone with the harasser or bully

### **Student Rights & Responsibilities**

Every student has the RIGHT to an education. Students also have the RESPONSIBILITY to be on time, be prepared, listen to instructions, do assigned work, and work in a way that does not infringe upon the learning of others.

Every student has the RIGHT to be heard. Students have the RESPONSIBILITY to listen and not interrupt those who are speaking.

Every student has the RIGHT to be safe. Students have the RESPONSIBILITY to treat others in a way that does not hurt them or cause them to be afraid at school or on the way to and from school.

Every student has the RIGHT to be respected and free from discrimination as set out in the BC Human Rights Code. Students have the RESPONSIBILITY to treat others with respect, and not tease, harass, or discriminate against other people.

Every student has the RIGHT to privacy and to his or her own personal space. Students have the RESPONSIBILITY to respect the personal property of others, and to accept their right to privacy.

### **Roller Blades/Skateboards/Bikes**

We encourage students to be physically active while at school. Students wishing to skateboard **must wear a helmet**. Other safety equipment (e.g., knee, wrist, and elbow pads) while not mandatory, is strongly encouraged, and left to the discretion of each child's parent. The use of bicycles, skateboards and rollerblades is not permitted during the school day. **Eugene Reimer Middle is NOT responsible for lost or stolen bikes.**

Bikes must be walked upon arrival at school and parked in the bike racks. Bike locks are required. Students are not permitted to be around the bike rack area during the school day. Please purchase a heavy-duty bike lock.

Students are expected to use common sense in terms of the safety of other students and themselves; stay out of the parking lots/driveways, use the crosswalk, and stay out of construction.

### **Jay-Walking**

Due to our school being in a busy area of the city, students are advised to always use crosswalks and never jay-walk anywhere, anytime. It may take a little extra time, but your safety is worth it. Please be careful!



### **Cell Phones, iPods, and other valuables**

Students are strongly discouraged from bringing valuables including ear buds, iPods, cell phones, valuable shoes, and clothing articles to school.

Do not bring large sums of money to school and never leave money or valuables in the PE change rooms.

If valuables are brought to school, they must be powered off and locked in lockers for the entire duration of the school day. **Valuable items are brought to school at the owner's risk; the SCHOOL is NOT responsible for any loss.**

### **Closed Campus**

ERMS has a closed campus policy. This means that only students who attend Eugene Reimer Middle are to be on the school grounds during the school day. It also means that once you arrive at school you remain on the grounds until the end of the day.

## **ROUTINES AND POLICIES**

### **Attendance**

Except for illness, appointments or unavoidable family concerns, all students should attend school every day. Absent students miss the lessons of the day and the learning that takes place in group discussions where students begin to appreciate the different views and abilities of others. Learning that is lost due to absence can never be adequately replaced!

When students must be away, parents are asked **to inform the school** before classes commence using an automated student attendance management system called Safe Arrival. Register at the Safe Arrival website: [go.schoolmessenger.ca](http://go.schoolmessenger.ca), download School Messenger APP or call 1-844-487-3701. These options are available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week. These Future absences can be reported at any time. Students will be requested to supply a doctor's note to verify long-term illness. Always, students are responsible to find out what work was missed and to make it up.

We strongly discourage students who miss part of the day's instruction to attend social functions later the same day. Please help us keep the priority on studies.

When students need to leave early for an appointment, please provide a note for the teacher requesting early dismissal. The student will then be required to take this note to the office where they must sign out. Upon returning to the school later in the day, the student is expected to sign back in at the office.

### **Illness at School**

When a student becomes ill at school, parents will be contacted to confirm that it is safe to send the child home. The medical room can be used with permission of a staff member until parental contact is made. In any case of illness or injury, no student is permitted to go home on his/her own initiative but must seek help at the office. **Accidents and emergencies are to be referred to the office immediately.**



### **Late Arrival**

Students who are late to class disrupt and consume the time of fellow classmates, teachers, and office staff. Please ensure your child arrives at school on time. Students who arrive late at any time must sign in at the office.

### **Hallway Behaviour**

The hallways are quiet areas in the building as is the Library Learning Commons to ensure that learning environments are not interrupted. Students and classes are to walk on the right-hand side of the hallways for safety reasons. Hallway behaviour and language should be suitable to an institution of learning. No profanity or inappropriate touching of others should occur at any time. Play fighting or rough housing is not permitted.

### **Textbooks**

Textbooks and other educational resources are property of the school and school district. Students are issued textbooks at the start of the year. Students are responsible for returning the same textbook they were originally issued upon “textbook checks” and the end of the year. Students will be charged for lost or damaged textbooks.

### **Lockers and Locks**

All students will be issued a combination lock and a locker. Locks must be obtained from the school for security reasons. **Lock combinations are to be memorized and NOT shared with anyone.** A \$7.00 fee is charged to any student who needs a lock replaced because they lost it or shared the combination with another student. Lockers are not to be shared. Graffiti, unacceptable pictures, and writing are not permitted, and a student can be instructed to remove them at any time. **Student lockers are the property of the school and are subject to search at any time, with or without notice.** Students may only go to their lockers outside of instruction time or outside of the designated times with teacher permission. To minimize the loss of instructional time we encourage students to maintain one binder organized by subject.

### **Homework**

Homework shall be monitored by individual teachers as well as teams of teachers. Work done at home is an important part of all learning. It is an expectation for all students to have homework completed and all assignments handed in on time. Eugene Reimer Middle School may offer a homework club available after school to assist students needing extra help and support.

It is our expectation that students in grades 6 and 7 spend 30 to 45 minutes per night, and grade 8 students between 45 to 60 minutes per night on homework. However, we need to keep in mind that although an evening school activity is important, students need time to be children too. There must be a balance between work and play. If parents believe their child is doing excessive amounts of homework, please contact your child’s teacher.



## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

### **Visitors**

All visitors are required to report to the office upon arrival to receive authorization for their presence in the school. Visitors must sign a book stating their name, the time they arrived, the room they will be in and then must sign out when they leave. Visitors on official business are welcome at our school. Those who arrive with no purpose are not welcome on school property. Please do not invite friends to visit the school during the school day.

### **Nutrition Break**

Students will be dismissed for a 15-minute nutrition break. Students are to go to their lockers, get their snacks, and return to class. Students are encouraged to use this time to visit the washrooms.

### **Lunch Time**

All students are to eat lunch in their classroom during the eating period. Following the destination bell, students are to go outside. Students may remain in the school following the destination bell only if they are being supervised by a teacher.

### **After School**

At the end of the school day students are to gather their belongings, homework, etc., and follow the routine set up between student and parent. Students are expected to be out of the school 15 minutes after dismissal unless they are participating in a supervised extra-curricular activity.

### **Extra-Curricular Activities**

Extra-curricular activities will be offered to students who wish to participate. These may involve after school clubs, trips, and sporting events. Extra-curricular activities are considered privileges and a student may be denied the opportunity to participate if behaviour, marks, or attendance are not good.

### **Learning Services**

If you require help with your schoolwork, or have a personal concern, there are several ways to get the support you need. Don't be afraid to ask your classroom teachers, student services teachers including counselors, administration, Police Liaison Officer, or any school staff member to lend a hand. At Eugene Reimer Middle we all work together to support one another.

### **Assemblies**

Assemblies do not take place daily; however, they are an important component of our school culture. They may include multi-media productions, speakers, and presentations by students, staff, parents, and professional performers from outside the school community.



Expectations for students include:

- walking to and from assembly areas in a quiet, orderly manner and seated as quickly as possible.
- being a courteous audience
- appreciation is shown by applause and active listening
- being alert to the person in charge of the program
- remaining seated throughout the program until the person in charge dismisses them from the assembly in an orderly fashion.

### **Bus Behaviour**

For safety reasons, the bus driver has authority over the students on the bus he/she operates. These drivers are to be given the same respect and courtesy given any staff member. Students who behave inappropriately on school buses will face consequences which may include removal from the bussing program. Students must remain on campus until the bus bell indicates it is time to go to RHSS. Reimer bus students are not permitted inside RHSS while they wait.

### **Field Trips/Travel**

Permission forms for all school authorized excursions must be signed by the parents/guardians prior to the departure date. Students are expected to behave themselves in a manner which reflects our school's code of conduct.

### **Parent Volunteers**

The quality of education in our school is greatly enhanced by parent volunteers. If you could spare some time each week to work at the school, please let us know of your interest. All volunteers must go through the mandatory screening process required by the District. A criminal record check may be required.

### **Emergency Drills**

There will be several fire drills, earthquake drills, and lockdown drills during the school year. Students should be familiar with the procedures for these emergencies. These drills should be considered serious and conducted without talking. Tampering with alarms or fire safety equipment is a serious offense and is punishable by law.

### **Student Telephone**

A phone is available for students to use and is in the main lobby entrance of the school. It is only to be used after school or during the day if a teacher has given written permission via either a note on paper or in the student's agenda. **PLEASE NOTE STUDENTS CANNOT DIAL LONG DISTANCE FROM THE STUDENT PHONE.**



### **Lost and Found**

Lost clothing, bags, etc. can be claimed from the Lost and Found box under the foyer stairs. Jewelry, purses, and other smaller items should be turned into the office and can be claimed from the office staff. Unclaimed items are donated to charity at various times during the year after being displayed for students to search.

### **Students with Medical Conditions**

We prefer arrangements to be made for students to take any medications at home. Where this is not possible, you and your doctor will have to fill out the "Request to Administer Medication" form available at the school. Additionally, it is imperative that parents keep the school informed on any health and or safety issues affecting a student attending Eugene Reimer Middle.

### **Internet Agreement**

The purpose of the school district network is to facilitate research and education amongst users by providing access to unique resources and the opportunity for collaborative work. Students at ERMS require parent's consent to participate in the use of Internet. Violations of the policy set out by School District #34 regarding Internet service can include temporary or permanent revocation of access rights to the System, suspension, expulsion or termination, or legal action.

### **Social Media Networks**

Many students at ERMS have personal computers at home or have access to them elsewhere. More often than we would like, teachers, counsellors, and administration at ERMS are asked to intervene in conflicts between students that began or took on a life of their own "via" internet email or Social Media accounts. We encourage students to make choices to use the social network sites and email services appropriately and to resist the urge to become "cyber-bullies" by speaking unkindly or spreading rumours. We also encourage parents to be vigilant in monitoring and supervising the length and kind of computer use of their children. ### **Emergency School Closures**

During emergency situations schools will be closed to ensure the greatest possible level of safety for students and staff. When it is determined that a school or all schools will be closed, each staff and student's household will receive a phone call from the District's Synervoice System indicating the level of closure. ### **Keys for Success**

There are many things that students can do to achieve success, and to have a rewarding and happy school year. Students are encouraged to:

### **Physical Activity**

At Eugene Reimer, we encourage students to be physically active while at school. Research has indicated that:

- Participation in regular physical activity has a positive impact on behaviour and healthy lifestyle.
- Regular physical activity enhances academic performance.
- Physical activity has a positive effect upon children's academic achievement, academic readiness, and perceptual skills.
- Regular physical activity improves children's mental health and contributes to their growth and development.
- Physical activity is consistently related to improved self-esteem and body image.
- Adolescents who engage regularly in physical activity demonstrate lower anxiety and depression.
- The prevalence of childhood obesity is increasing which is directly linked to a lack of physical activity.
- Overweight and obesity in childhood are linked to many health risks and even mortality in adulthood.
- Participation in physical activity is positively linked to aerobic fitness, body composition, and muscular strength among school children.
- Daily physical activity improves children's skeletal health, which in turn reduces their risk of developing osteoporosis in the future.
- High school students, who are physically active, are less likely to smoke, use marijuana, or engage in sexual risk behaviours when compared to inactive peers.
- Adolescents who are more physically active are less likely to consume alcohol.

### **What are Effective Schools?**

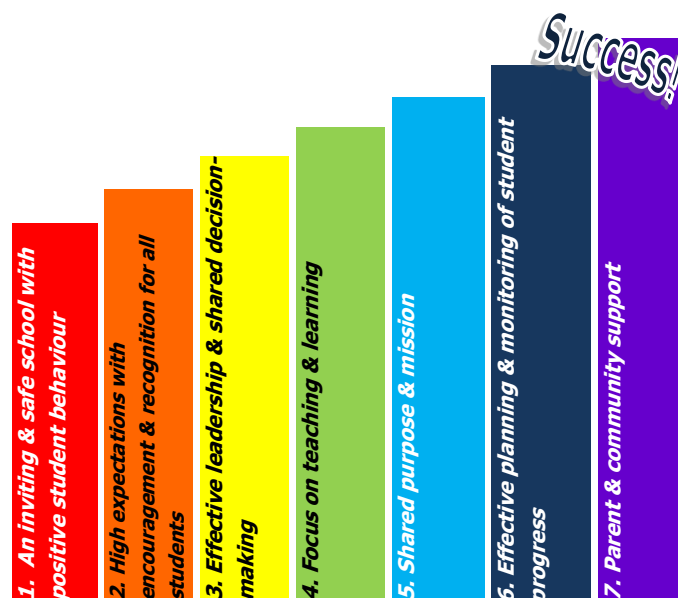
According to the most recent research, effective schools are places where . . .

1. All students learn as a result of focused teacher actions.
2. All students learn regardless of their socioeconomic status or family background.
3. Student attendance, behaviour and attitudes improve because of improved achievement.
4. Staff accept that "improving schools" share common characteristics.

## Student and School Success

Student achievement, attendance, attitudes, and behaviours can be influenced by actions taken by schools. When schools are improving on these measures, they tend to focus on seven indicators:

1. An inviting & safe school with positive student behavior
2. High expectations with encouragement & recognition for all students
3. Effective leadership & shared decision-making
4. Focus on teaching & learning
5. Shared purpose & mission
6. Effective planning & monitoring of student progress
7. Parent & community support



## **Eugene Reimer Middle School Schedule of Fees**

### Step 1: Register

- Complete each of the three Registration Steps  
\*For Security Reasons your password, requires **8 characters**, **one uppercase** letter, **one lowercase** letter and a **number**.



### Step 2: Confirmation Email (example on right)

A confirmation email will be sent to the email address you used to register. Log into your email and click on the link provided inside to confirm your email address and School Cash Online account. The confirmation link will open the School Cash Online site prompting you to sign into your account. Use your email address and password just created with your account.



### Step 3: Add Student (example on right)

**Note: Student Number is Not Required**

This step will connect your children to your account.

- Type in "Abbotsford School District"
- Choose "Eugene Reimer Middle School" from the drop down menu
- Click the box next to "I don't have the student number."
- Enter First & Last Name
- Click on the small red calendar to the right of the "Birth Date" and choose your child's birth date.
- Click **Confirm**
- On the next page confirm that you are related to the child, check in the Agree box and select **Continue**
- Your child has been added to your account

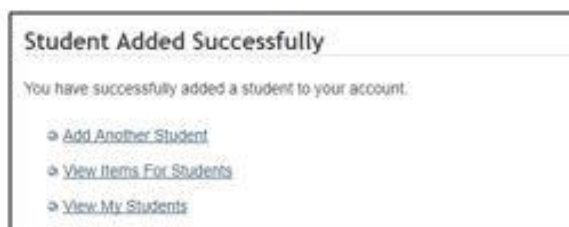

### **What We Believe About Parent Involvement**

The teaching community at Eugene Reimer Middle School believes that building partnerships with parents is a critical element to a child's success and development. To this end teachers make their School District e-mail addresses available and encourage conversation and dialogue through e-mail, telephone, and this student planner. The most effective means of communication is person to person. We invite parents to visit the school anytime but, particularly during the times set aside for parent/teacher conferences or other events at the school. We encourage parents and their children to work with the teachers to problem-solve issues or concerns; this triadic partnership can be very powerful for students' success.

### **Our Parents**

We have a very active Parent Advisory Committee. The first PAC meeting of the school year will be published in September. We try to keep the meetings to an hour. We also have a very active School Planning Council, the members of which are elected by the PAC. This group meets with the Principal regularly to discuss a range of school related issues and provide direction for and input into school-based decisions

Historically our parents volunteer for the leadership committees described above and help with events around the school such as: Student celebrations, Sports Day, Teacher Appreciation, Library assistance, Fundraising, which is an important source of funding for school programs.

### **What Does Research Tell Us About the Influence of Parental Involvement on Student Achievement?**

1. Student achievement improves in a home environment which encourages learning.
2. Student achievement improves when parents express high (but not unrealistic) expectations for their children's achievement and future careers.
3. Student achievement improves when parents become involved in their children's education at school and in the community.
4. Student achievement improves when parents are enabled to play four key roles in their children's learning.
  - ◆ \*As **teachers**, parents create a home environment that promotes learning, reinforces what is being taught at school, and develops the life skills children need to become responsible adults.
  - ◆ \*As **supporters**, parents contribute their knowledge and skills to the school, enriching the curriculum, and providing extra services and support to students .
  - ◆ \*As **advocates**, parents help children negotiate the system and receive fair treatment, and work to make the system more responsive to all families.
