ABBOTSFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT CODE OF CONDUCT

The Abbotsford School District expects all students to conduct themselves in a manner worthy of the respect of others:

- Be honest and forthright.
- Treat others with respect and courtesy.
- Respect the property of others.
- Attend regularly and punctually.
- Work to the best of their abilities.

And to promote and maintain a climate which is free of:

- Lying
- Weapons
- Intimidation
- Cheating
- Prejudicial Behaviour
- Harassment
- Theft
- Racism
- Illegal substances, or substances that can be abused.

Conduct by any student that adversely affects a school's climate or operation, including disruption of the learning environment, shall be considered a breach of the District Code of Conduct, warranting appropriate forms of intervention that may include suspension from attendance.

About our School Colours

Our school colours are black, silver, red and white.

- **BLACK** represents the predominant colour of the North American raven.
- **SILVER** represents the lining of a cloud where a raven flies. The "silver lining" provides comfort, protection, and an inspiration for the future.
- **RED** and **WHITE** represent two important ideals:
 - The colours of the Canadian Flag, the flag and country which Eugene Reimer represented so well, winning over 50 national and 22 international medals over his 22-year athletic career.
 - The colours of BC Disability Sports represent perseverance, strength, ability, dedication, and an opportunity to achieve.



About our Mascot: The Raven

The raven is a black, glossy bird that is a member of the crow family. The raven is known for its competitiveness, intelligence, mastery, adaptability, and ability to cooperate. We feel many of these qualities are ones Eugene Reimer students should strive to accomplish.



Our Namesake: Dr. Eugene Reimer



Our school proudly displays the name of a Canadian hero, Eugene Reimer. Eugene Reimer's story, his commitment to service, unwavering positive attitude, and his passion for enabling others to set goals and realize their potential is a compass for the staff and students at Eugene Reimer Middle School.

Eugene Reimer's significant contributions to sports and to athletes with a disability are unparalleled. An inspiration to thousands of disabled individuals, Eugene has proven that a wheelchair is not a handicap, but rather, an opportunity for athletic achievement.

Following a childhood bout with polio, the longtime Abbotsford resident was left with only minimal use of his legs. In the 1960s, when wheelchair sports were in their infancy, Eugene took on sports with a passion. He excelled in a wide variety of competitions, including weightlifting, archery, swimming, basketball, volleyball, and track and field events. Eugene Reimer quickly became one of British Columbia's top all-around athletes.

From 1968, until his retirement from sports in 1980, Eugene amassed over 50 national and 22 international medals, 10 in the Paralympic Games (5 Gold, 4 Silver, 1 Bronze) He participated and excelled in prestigious world events, such as the International Paralympics (4 appearances), PanAm Wheelchair Games, and B.C. Wheelchair Games. In 1972, Eugene set new world records at the Paralympic Games in Heidelberg, Germany, by taking gold medals in both discus and pentathlon, and a silver medal for the 4 x 60 m relay.

Eugene was named "Canadian Outstanding Male Athlete of the Year" in 1972, the first time that such a level of recognition had been awarded to an athlete with a disability. In 1974, he was awarded the Order of Canada medal for his "inspiring example to the handicapped". In 1991, the B.C. Sports Hall of Fame and Museum presented Eugene with the W.A.C. Bennett Award, in recognition of his special contribution to the Province of B.C.



In 2000, Eugene was inducted into the Terry Fox Hall of Fame (now known as the Canadian Disability Hall of Fame). Later that same year, the Eugene Reimer Award was established. This award is presented annually and recognizes a British Columbian who makes an outstanding contribution in the field of sport, recreation, or physical education for persons with disabilities. Abbotsford's own Eugene Reimer was honoured as the inaugural recipient. On May 2nd, 2002, Eugene Reimer was the first disabled athlete inducted into the B. C. Sports Hall of Fame.

A valued ambassador for people with physical disabilities, Mr. Reimer chaired the 2002 BC Disability Games held in Abbotsford. In nominating Mr. Reimer for this honour, renowned British Columbian Rick Hansen noted, "Eugene was an incredible inspiration to me as a young athlete and he continues to inspire all who know him and/or his story." Board Chairman, John Smith, added, "Eugene Reimer is a highly distinguished Abbotsford Native whose courage, dedication and many achievements are an excellent model for the youth of our community, and particularly those attending the school that will bear his name."

In June 2023, community members joined students and staff at Eugene Reimer Middle School to remember the life and legacy of Eugene Reimer, as well as to celebrate the school's 20th anniversary.

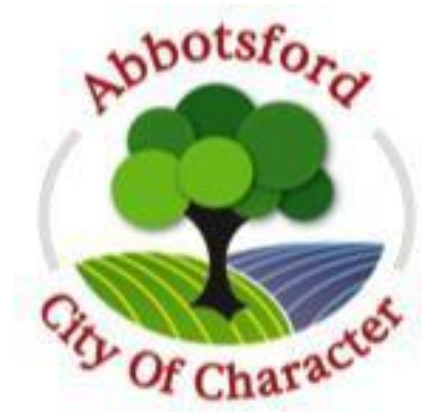


Eugene Reimer Middle School and Abbotsford City of Character Shared Values

ERMS STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

Statement of Purpose

The ERMS Code of Conduct serves as a guide for all members of our learning community. It is designed to promote a healthy, safe, caring environment for students of all abilities to learn. We value diversity and equality in our building and always strive for a learning environment free from discrimination as stated in the Human Rights Code.

Conduct Expectations

Eugene Reimer Middle School students are expected to always demonstrate character traits while at school in all settings, and when off campus representing our school on field trips, at sports events and extra-curricular activities.



Rising Expectations

As students mature, they can expect to be presented with more opportunities to demonstrate responsibility in our building. As such, they will become leaders in the school community. They will develop leadership skills and recognize the value they present as role models to younger students and community partners.

As students get older and become more aware of personal responsibility, they will also understand the need for increasing consequences for inappropriate behaviour.

Acceptable Conduct

Students are expected to conform to high standards of behaviour when at school, on the way to and from school, and while attending any school function or field trip. Students should strive towards—but are not limited to the following behaviours:

- Demonstrating exemplary character traits
- Respecting the rights of members of the ERMS community
- Promoting an environment of understanding & mutual respect
- Working to the best of their abilities
- Being honest and forthright
- Caring for each other
- Leaving a situation better than it was found
- Becoming an expert at something
- Representing ERMS positively at all times

Consequences

Violations to the ERMS Code of Conduct will result in consistent and fair disciplinary action. The development of self-discipline is an important goal at our school. The goal of the disciplinary action is for students to learn from their mistakes and be restorative rather than punitive. The violation will be dealt with on an individual basis. The severity and frequency of the violation and the age, maturity, and needs of the student will be considered when determining appropriate action.

Harassment & Bullying

Harassment or Bullying is against the District Code of Conduct and will be dealt with severely and quickly. Harassment or bullying is inappropriate remarks, jokes, taunting, comments, gestures, sexually suggestive comments, or actions that create an uncomfortable environment.

A Bully is someone who:

- uses power to hurt others or harm their possessions;
- purposely scares or intimidates others;
- often hurts the same person repeatedly;
- is sometimes supported by other people who just watch and laugh, instead of helping the person being bullied.

If a student feels s/he is being harassed or bullied, he or should:

- tell the person to stop
- tell a parent/guardian, teacher, or another adult with whom you feel comfortable discussing the issue
- try to stay away from places or times they might be alone with the harasser or bully

Student Rights & Responsibilities

- Every student has the **RIGHT** to an education. Students also have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to be on time, be prepared, listen to instructions, do assigned work, and work in a way that does not infringe upon the learning of others.



- Every student has the **RIGHT** to be heard. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to listen and not interrupt those who are speaking.
- Every student has the **RIGHT** to be safe. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to treat others in a way that does not hurt them or cause them to be afraid at school or on the way to and from school.
- Every student has the **RIGHT** to be respected and free from discrimination as set out in the BC Human Rights Code. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to treat others with respect, and not tease, harass, or discriminate against other people.
- Every student has the **RIGHT** to privacy and to his or her own personal space. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to respect the personal property of others, and to accept their right to privacy.

Student Dress Expectations

As per [AP 318 – Student Dress Code and School Uniforms](#), guidelines are

1. Clothing and accessories cannot pose a safety concern or conceal one's identity
2. Specific attire may be required for a variety of classroom settings such as Explorations, Physical Education/Fitness, science labs, etc.
3. Clothing must cover undergarments.
4. When there are differences in perspective, all involved have a duty to seek common understanding in a mutually respectful manner. Ultimately, the school administration has the responsibility to apply the dress policy where necessary. If any person dresses in an inappropriate manner, they will be advised personally and discreetly.

Care of School Property and Vandalism

The destruction or defacing of property belonging to the school or to others is strictly prohibited. Students are responsible for taking care of all of school property, as they will be held accountable for any damage to desks, chairs, locks and lockers, textbooks, library books, school technology and other equipment. Students will be charged full replacement cost for loss or damage to any school equipment.

Profanity

As per [Board Policy 15 – Student Code of Conduct](#), the use of inappropriate language, including language that is profane, obscene, racist, sexist, homophobic, or otherwise offensive, is not acceptable school behaviour. Disciplinary action will be taken for violations.

Banned Substances and Weapons

All alcohol products, marijuana and its paraphernalia, all vaping (e-cigarettes) and tobacco products are NOT allowed on the school grounds or in the school at ANY time. Parents/guardians will be contacted, and disciplinary action will follow the school district [AP 331 – Drugs and Controlled Substance Abuse](#). Additionally, pop and energy drinks are not to be consumed at school.

As per [Board Policy 15 – Student Code of Conduct](#), any type of weapon, replica or genuine, including but not limited to guns, knives, slingshots, clubs, brass knuckles, lighters and matches, laser pointers, firecrackers or fireworks, bear spray, etc. are not allowed on school grounds or in the school at any time, or at any school activity. Parents/guardians will be contacted, and disciplinary action will be levied on any student who is found to be carrying a weapon (or replica) to, from, or within the school, or to, from, or at any school activity.



Hallway Behaviour

The hallways are quiet areas in the building as is the Library Learning Commons to ensure that learning environments are not interrupted. Students and classes are to walk on the right-hand side of the hallways for safety reasons. Hallway behaviour and language should be suitable to an institution of learning. No profanity or inappropriate touching of others should occur at any time. Play fighting or rough housing is not permitted.

Cell Phones, iPods, and other valuables

Students are strongly discouraged from bringing valuables including ear buds, cell phones, valuable shoes, and clothing articles to school. All cell phones must be powered off and left in lockers during the school day (including nut-break and lunch). Cell phones can be used before and/or after school.

Do not bring large sums of money to school and never leave money or valuables in the PE change rooms.

Valuable items are brought to school at the owner's risk; the SCHOOL is NOT responsible for any loss.

Bikes, Skateboards, Scooters, Hoverboards and Rollerblades

Students wishing to ride bikes, skateboards, scooters, hoverboards, or rollerblades **must wear a helmet and use a specific area of the school that will be identified**. Other safety equipment (e.g., knee, wrist, and elbow pads) while not mandatory, is strongly encouraged, and left to the discretion of each child's parent. The use of bicycles, skateboards, scooters, and rollerblades is not permitted on school property during the school day. Bikes and scooters must be walked upon arrival at school and locked on the racks. Bike locks are required - please purchase a heavy-duty bike lock. **Students are not permitted to be around the bike rack area during the school day.**

Students are expected to use common sense in terms of the safety of other students and themselves; stay out of the parking lots/driveways, use the crosswalk, and stay out of construction.

ERMS is NOT responsible for lost or stolen bikes, skateboards, scooters, hoverboards, or rollerblades.

Closed Campus

ERMS has a closed campus policy. This means that only students who attend Eugene Reimer Middle are to be on the school grounds during the school day. It also means that once you arrive at school you remain on the grounds until the end of the day. Students being picked up or dropped off during the school day (for medical appointments, etc.) should be met in the school office by a parent or guardian to be signed out. Those who arrive with no purpose are not welcome on school property. Please do not invite friends to visit the school during the school day.

ROUTINES AND POLICIES

Attendance

Except for illness, appointments or unavoidable family concerns, all students should attend school every day. Absent students miss the lessons of the day and the learning that takes place in group discussions where students begin to appreciate the different views and abilities of others. Learning that is lost due to absence can never be adequately replaced!

When students must be away, parents are asked **to inform the school**. ***Always, students are responsible to find out what work was missed and to make it up.***

Students who miss a day or part of a day can only play a school-related game or attend a school social function with the permission of school administration.



Arriving Late and Leaving Early

If you arrive late (after classes have begun for the day) you must sign in at the office before going to class

If you are leaving early (example, for a medical appointment) you must sign out at the office; students may not leave campus without permission from their parent/guardian

Illness at School

When a student becomes ill at school, parents will be contacted to confirm that it is safe to send the child home. The medical room can be used with the permission of a staff member until parental contact is made. In any case of illness or injury, no student is permitted to go home on his/her own initiative but must seek help at the office. **Accidents and emergencies are to be referred to the office immediately.**

Textbooks

Textbooks and other educational resources are property of the school and school district. Students are issued textbooks at the start of the year. Students are responsible for returning the same textbook they were originally issued upon “textbook checks” and the end of the year. Students will be charged for lost or damaged textbooks.

Lockers and Locks

All students will be issued a combination lock and a locker. No personal locks are permitted; locks must be obtained from the school for security reasons. **Lock combinations are to be memorized and NOT shared with anyone.** A \$7.00 fee is charged to any student who needs a lock replaced because they lost it or shared the combination with another student. Lockers are not to be shared. Graffiti, unacceptable pictures, and writing are not permitted, and a student can be instructed to remove them at any time. **Student lockers are the property of the school and are subject to search at any time, with or without notice.** Students may only go to their lockers outside of instruction time or outside of the designated times with teacher permission. To minimize the loss of instructional time we encourage students to maintain one binder organized by subject.

Homework

Homework shall be monitored by individual teachers as well as teams of teachers. Work done at home is an important part of all learning. It is an expectation for all students to have homework completed and all assignments handed in on time. Eugene Reimer Middle School may offer a homework club available after school to assist students needing extra help and support.

It is our expectation that students in grades 6 and 7 spend 30 to 45 minutes per night, and grade 8 students between 45 to 60 minutes per night on homework. However, we need to keep in mind that although an evening school activity is important, students need time to be children too. There must be a balance between work and play. If parents believe their child is doing excessive amounts of homework, please contact your child’s teacher.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Nutrition Break



Students will be dismissed for a 15-minute nutrition break. Students are encouraged to use this time to visit the washrooms. Students are to go to their lockers, get their snacks, and head outside right away. Note that we go outside rain or shine, so please ***dress for the weather***. As the fall and winter weather approaches, hats, gloves, coats, and boots are all essential.

Lunch Time

All students are to eat lunch in their classroom during the eating period. Following the destination bell, student are to go outside. Note that we go outside rain or shine, so please ***dress for the weather***. As the fall and winter weather approaches, hats, gloves, coats, and boots are all essential. Students may remain in the school following the destination bell ***only if they are being directly supervised by a teacher.***

Canteen Cards (“Nest Cards”)

Our canteen, The Nest, is open at Nutrition Break and during the eating period of lunch. There are a variety of snack options that students may purchase, either using cash or a Nest Card, which is a punch card that can be paid for through SchoolCashOnline.

After School

At the end of the school day students are to gather their belongings, homework, etc., and follow the routine set up between student and parent. Students are expected to be out of the school 15 minutes after dismissal unless they are participating in a supervised extra-curricular activity.

Bus Behaviour

For safety reasons, the bus driver has authority over the students on the bus he/she operates. These drivers are to be given the same respect and courtesy given any staff member. Students who behave inappropriately on school buses will face consequences which may include removal from the bussing program. ***ERMS bus students are not permitted inside RHSS while they wait.***

Assemblies

Assemblies do not take place daily; however, they are an important component of our school culture. They may include multi-media productions, speakers, and presentations by students, staff, parents, and professional performers from outside the school community.

Expectations for students include:

- walking to and from assembly areas in a quiet, orderly manner and seated as quickly as possible.
- being a courteous audience
- appreciation is shown by applause and active listening
- being alert to the person in charge of the program
- remaining seated throughout the program until the person in charge dismisses them from the assembly in an orderly fashion.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Extra-curricular activities will be offered to students who wish to participate. These may involve after school clubs, trips, and sporting events. Extra-curricular activities are considered privileges and a student may be denied the opportunity to participate if behaviour, marks, or attendance are not good.



Field Trips/Travel

Students are expected to behave themselves in a manner which reflects our school's code of conduct.

Learning Services

If you require help with your schoolwork, or have a personal concern, there are several ways to get the support you need. Seek help from your classroom teachers, student services teachers including counselors, Youth Care Worker, school administration, or any school staff member.

Emergency Drills

There will be several fire drills, earthquake drills, shelter in place and lockdown drills during the school year. Students should be familiar with the procedures for these emergencies. These drills should be considered serious and conducted without talking. Tampering with alarms or fire safety equipment is a serious offense and is punishable by law.

Student Telephone

A phone is available for students to use and is in the main lobby entrance of the school. It is only to be used after school or during the day if a teacher has given written permission via either a note on paper or in the student's agenda.

Lost and Found

Lost clothing, bags, etc. can be claimed from the Lost and Found box under the foyer stairs. Jewelry, purses, wallets, phones, and other smaller items should be turned into the office and can be claimed from the office staff. Unclaimed items are donated to charity at various times during the year after being displayed for students to search.

Internet Agreement & Social Media Networks

The purpose of the school district network is to facilitate research and education amongst users by providing access to unique resources and the opportunity for collaborative work. Students at ERMS require parent's consent to participate in the use of Internet and digital devices at school. Many students at ERMS have personal computers at home or have access to them elsewhere. More often than we would like, teachers, counsellors, and administration at ERMS are asked to intervene in conflicts between students that began or took on a life of their own "via" internet email or Social Media accounts. Violations of [Board Policy 15 – Student Code of Conduct](#) regarding Internet use can include temporary or permanent revocation of access rights to the System, suspension, expulsion or termination, or legal action. We encourage students to make choices to use the social network sites and email services appropriately and to resist the urge to become "cyber-bullies" by speaking unkindly or spreading rumours.

Emergency School Closures

During emergency situations schools will be closed to ensure the greatest possible level of safety for students and staff. When it is determined that a school or all schools will be closed, each staff and student's household will receive a phone call from the District's Synervice System indicating the level of closure. Physical Activity



At Eugene Reimer, we encourage students to be physically active while at school. Research has indicated that:

- Participation in regular physical activity has a positive impact on behaviour and healthy lifestyle.
- Regular physical activity enhances academic performance.
- Physical activity has a positive effect on academic achievement, academic readiness, and perceptual skills.
- Regular physical activity improves mental health and contributes to their growth and development.
- Physical activity is consistently related to improved self-esteem and body image.
- Adolescents who engage regularly in physical activity demonstrate lower anxiety and depression.
- The prevalence of childhood obesity is increasing which is directly linked to a lack of physical activity.
- Overweight and obesity in childhood are linked to many health risks and even mortality in adulthood.
- Participation in physical activity is positively linked to aerobic fitness, body composition, and muscular strength among school children.
- Daily physical activity improves skeletal health, which in turn reduces their risk of developing osteoporosis in the future.
- High school students, who are physically active, are less likely to smoke, use marijuana, or engage in sexual risk behaviours when compared to inactive peers.
- Adolescents who are more physically active are less likely to consume alcohol.

Keys for Success

There are many things that students can do to achieve success, and to have a rewarding and happy school year. Students are encouraged to:

- get involved in special activities - there is something for everyone
- ask for help when you need it
- complete homework assignments carefully and on time
- be committed to making this the best year you have had at school.

What are Effective Schools?

According to the most recent research, effective schools are places where . . .

1. All students learn as a result of focused teacher actions.
2. All students learn regardless of their socioeconomic status or family background.
3. Student attendance, behaviour and attitudes improve because of improved achievement.
4. Staff accept that “improving schools” share common characteristics.

Student and School Success

Student achievement, attendance, attitudes, and behaviours can be influenced by actions taken by schools. When schools are improving on these measures, they tend to focus on seven indicators:

1. An inviting & safe school with positive student behavior
2. High expectations with encouragement & recognition for all students
3. Effective leadership & shared decision-making
4. Focus on teaching & learning
5. Shared purpose & mission
6. Effective planning & monitoring of student progress



7. Parent & community support

- Flash a smile here and there and return one given to you.
- Don't crowd in social groups in the middle of the hallway.
- Include all genders, races, and learners.
- Take the time to learn about other cultures.
- Report violence and bullying.
- Accept the mistakes of others.

- If you want to get respect - first give it.
- Try not to judge but understand other cultures.
- Understanding is the key.
- Teachers willing to listen and students willing to learn are the key to success.
