ERMS Student Code of Conduct: Statement of Purpose

The ERMS Code of Conduct serves as a guide for all members of our learning community. It is designed to promote a healthy, safe, caring environment for students of all abilities to learn. We value equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility in our school building and always strive for a learning environment free from discrimination as stated in the British Columbia Human Rights Code.

Conduct Expectations

As students mature, they can expect to be presented with more opportunities to demonstrate responsibility in our school building. They will develop leadership skills and recognize the value they present as role models to younger students and community partners.

Students will also become more aware of personal responsibility and understand the need for increasing consequences for inappropriate behaviour.

Eugene Reimer Middle School students are expected to always demonstrate character traits at all times in our school building, and when off campus representing our school on field trips, at sports events and extracurricular activities or on the school bus.

Acceptable Conduct

Students are expected to conform to high standards of behaviour when at school, on the way to and from school, and while attending any school function or field trip. Students should strive towards—but are not limited to the following behaviours:

- Demonstrating exemplary character traits
- Respecting the rights of members of the ERMS community
- Promoting an environment of understanding & mutual respect Becoming an expert at something
- Working to the best of their abilities
- Being honest and forthright

- Caring for each other
- Leaving a situation better than it was found
- Always Representing ERMS positively

Consequences

Violations to the ERMS Code of Conduct will result in consistent and fair disciplinary action. The development of selfdiscipline is an important goal at our school. The goal of the disciplinary action is for students to learn from their mistakes and be restorative rather than punitive. The violation will be dealt with on an individual basis. The severity and frequency of the violation and the age, maturity, and needs of the student will be considered when determining appropriate action.

Harassment & Bullying

Harassment or Bullying is against the District Code of Conduct and will be dealt with severely and quickly. Harassment or bullying is inappropriate remarks, jokes, taunting, comments, gestures, sexually suggestive comments, or actions that create an uncomfortable environment in person and/or online.

A Bully is someone who:

- uses power to hurt others or harm their possessions
- purposely scares or intimidates others
- often hurts the same person repeatedly
- is sometimes supported by other people who just watch, instead of helping the person being bullied If a student feels he or she is being harassed or bullied, he or she should:
 - tell the person to stop
 - tell a parent/guardian, teacher, administrator, or another trusted adult
 - try to stay away from places or times they might be alone with the harasser or bully

If a student is aware of someone who is being bullied, he or she should tell a parent/guardian, teacher, administrator, or another trusted adult.

Student Rights & Responsibilities

- Every student has the RIGHT to an education. Students have the RESPONSIBILITY to be on time, be prepared, listen to instructions, do assigned work, and work in a way that does not infringe upon the learning of others.
- Every student has the **RIGHT** to be heard. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to listen and not interrupt those who are speaking.

- Every student has the **RIGHT** to be safe. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to treat others in a way that does not hurt them or cause them to be afraid at school or on the way to and from school.
- Every student has the **RIGHT** to be respected and free from discrimination as set out in the BC Human Rights Code. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to treat others with respect, and not tease, harass, or discriminate against other people.
- Every student has the **RIGHT** to privacy and to his or her own personal space. Students have the **RESPONSIBILITY** to respect the personal property of others, and to accept their right to privacy.

Banned Substances and Weapons

All alcohol products, marijuana and its paraphernalia, all vaping (e-cigarettes) and tobacco products are NOT allowed on the school grounds or in the school building at ANY time. These items are not permitted at any school activity, field trip, or event. Parents/guardians will be contacted, and disciplinary action will follow the school district AP 331 – Drugs and Controlled Substance Abuse. Additionally, pop and energy drinks are not consumed at school.

As per <u>Board Policy 15 – Student Code of Conduct</u>, any type of weapon, replica or genuine, including but not limited to guns, knives, slingshots, clubs, brass knuckles, lighters and matches, laser pointers, firecrackers or fireworks, bear spray, etc. are not allowed on school grounds or in the school at any time, or at any school activity, field trip or event. Parents/guardians will be contacted, and disciplinary action will be levied on any student who is found to be carrying a weapon (or replica) to, from, or within the school, or to, from, or at any school activity, field trip or event.

Care of School Property and Vandalism

The destruction or defacing of property belonging to the school or to others is strictly prohibited. Students are responsible for taking care of all of school property, as they will be held accountable for any damage to desks, chairs, locks and lockers, textbooks, library books, school technology, and other equipment. Students will be charged full replacement cost for loss or damage to any school equipment.

Student Dress Expectations

As per AP 318 - Student Dress Code and School Uniforms, student dress expectations are:

- 1. Clothing and accessories cannot pose a safety concern or conceal one's identity
- 2. Specific attire may be required for a variety of classroom settings such as Explorations, Physical Education/Fitness, science labs, etc.
- 3. Clothing must cover undergarments.
- 4. When there are differences in perspective, all involved have a duty to seek common understanding in a mutually respectful manner. Ultimately, the school administration has the responsibility to apply the dress policy where necessary. If any person dresses in an inappropriate manner, they will be advised personally and discreetly.

Profanity

As per <u>Board Policy 15 – Student Code of Conduct</u>, the use of inappropriate language, including language that is profane, obscene, racist, sexist, homophobic, or otherwise offensive, is not acceptable on the school grounds or in the school building at ANY time. This language is also not permitted at any school activity, field trips, or events. Disciplinary action will be taken for violations.

Attendance

Except for illness, appointments or unavoidable family concerns, all students should attend school every day. Absent students miss the lessons of the day and the learning that takes place in group discussions where students begin to appreciate the different views and abilities of others. Learning that is lost due to absence can never be adequately replaced! *Always, students are responsible to find out what work was missed and to make it up.*Students who miss a day or part of a day can only play a school-related game or attend a school social function with the permission of the school administration.

When students must be away, parents are asked <u>to inform the school</u>. The most convenient way of doing this is using the **SchoolMessenger App** (free download from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store). Using this app will also allow families to receive electronic newsletters and updates from school.

Students who arrive late (after the second bell) MUST sign in at the office before going to class.

Students leaving early (for example: a medical appointment) **MUST** sign out at the office; students may **not** leave campus without permission from their parent/guardian.

Administration of Medication

If your child requires medication to be taken at school, please complete form AP 328 - Administration of Medication to Students. This form is available from the office or on the school district website (abbyschools.ca). Have the form completed by your doctor and signed by parent/guardian as indicated and return to the school as soon as possible.

After School

At the end of the school day students are to gather their belongings, homework, etc., and follow the routine set up between student and parent (such as walking home, waiting for pick up, taking the School Bus or City Bus, etc.). Students are expected to be out of the school no more than 15 minutes after dismissal unless they are participating in a supervised extra-curricular activity.

Assemblies

Assemblies do not take place daily; however, they are an important component of our school culture. They may include multi-media productions, speakers, and presentations by students, staff, parents, and professional performers from outside the school community.

Expectations for students include:

- walking to and from assembly areas in a quiet, orderly manner and seated as quickly as possible;
- being a courteous audience;
- appreciation is shown by applause and active listening;
- being alert to the person in charge of the program;
- remaining seated throughout the program until the person in charge dismisses them from the assembly in an orderly fashion.

<u>Bikes, Skateboards, Scooters, Rollerblades</u>

Students wishing to ride bikes, skateboards, non-motorized scooters, or rollerblades **must wear a helmet and use** a specific area of the school that will be identified. Other safety equipment (e.g., knee, wrist, and elbow pads), while not mandatory, is strongly encouraged, and left to the discretion of each child's parent. The use of bicycles, skateboards, scooters, and rollerblades is **not** permitted on school property during the school day.

Bikes and scooters must be walked upon arrival at school and locked on the racks. Bike locks are required - please purchase a heavy-duty bike lock. Students are not permitted to be around the bike rack area during the school day.

Students are expected to use common sense in terms of the safety of other students and themselves; stay out of the parking lots/driveways, use the crosswalk, and stay out of construction.

ERMS is NOT responsible for lost or stolen bikes, skateboards, scooters, or rollerblades.

E-Scooters and Hoverboards

E-scooters are not permitted on school property. Although there is a pilot project in BC where certain cities are piloting e-scooters, they are *not* permitted in the City of Abbotsford. In the cities that are being piloted the rider must be 16+ years old, wearing helmets, not on sidewalks, and obeying traffic rules as a vehicle. Please visit https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/transportation/driving-and-cycling/cycling/electric-kick-scooter-rules for more information. Hoverboards are also not permitted on school property.

Breaks

There is a 15-minute nutrition break after the first two periods of the day. Students are encouraged to use this time to visit the washrooms. Students are to go to their lockers, get their snacks, and head outside right away. Note that we go outside in the rain or shine, so please *dress for the weather*. As the fall and winter weather approaches, hats, gloves, coats, and boots are all essential.

All students are to eat lunch in their classroom during the eating period – students are not to congregate in the hallway or at lockers. At the end of the eating period, students are to go outside. Note that we go outside in the rain or shine, so please *dress for the weather*. As the fall and winter weather approaches, hats, gloves, coats, and boots are all essential. Students may remain in the school following the destination bell *only if a teacher is directly supervising them.*

Bus Behaviour

For safety reasons, the bus driver has authority over the students on the bus he/she operates. These drivers are to be given the same respect and courtesy given by any staff member. Students who behave

inappropriately on school buses will face consequences which may include Bus Memo notifications to families of infractions. Repeated infractions may result in removal from the bussing program. <u>ERMS bus students are not permitted inside Rick Hansen Secondary while they wait – bus students should visit the washroom and get water before going to Rick Hansen Secondary at the end of the day.</u> Students who do not take a school district bus from Rick Hansen Secondary are not permitted to wait at Rick Hansen Secondary.

Cell Phones, iPods, and other valuables

Students are strongly discouraged from bringing valuables including ear buds, cell phones, valuable shoes, and clothing articles. All cell phones must be powered off and left in lockers during the school day (including nutrition break and lunch). Cell phones may be used before and/or after school once students have exited the building. Do not bring large sums of money to school and never leave money or valuables in the PE changing rooms.

Valuable items are brought to school at the owner's risk; the SCHOOL is NOT responsible for any loss.

Closed Campus

ERMS has a closed campus policy. This means that only students who attend Eugene Reimer Middle are to be on the school grounds during the school day. It also means that once you arrive at school you remain on the grounds until the end of the day. Students being picked up or dropped off during the school day (for medical appointments, etc.) should be met in the school office by a parent or guardian to be signed out. Those who arrive with no purpose are not welcome on school property. Please do not invite friends to visit the school during the school day.

Emergency Drills

Schools are required to perform fire drills, earthquake drills, shelter in place and lockdown drills during the school year. Students should be familiar with the procedures for these emergencies. These drills should be considered serious and conducted without talking. Tampering with alarms or fire safety equipment is a serious offense and is punishable by law.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Extra-curricular activities will be offered to students who wish to participate. These may involve after school clubs, trips, and sporting events. Extra-curricular activities are considered privileges, and a student may be denied the opportunity to participate due to behaviour that does not meet the code of conduct, low marks, or poor attendance.

Field Trips/Travel

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner which reflects our school's code of conduct. Permission forms signed by parents/guardians are required for participation, and families should ensure they are signed up for SchoolCash Online (schoolcashonline.com) to receive notifications about field trips. It is required that each student must have medical insurance coverage/care card# to participate in any field trip or off-school grounds activity.

Hallway Behaviour

The hallways are quiet areas in the building, as is the Library Learning Commons to ensure that learning environments are not interrupted. Students and classes are to walk on the right-hand side of the hallways for safety reasons. Hallway behaviour and language should be suitable for an institution of learning. No profanity or inappropriate touching of others should occur at any time. Play fighting or rough housing is not permitted.

Homework

Homework and review of concepts taught in class are important parts of all learning, as is reading daily. It is an expectation for all students to have homework completed and all assignments handed in on time.

Illness at School

When a student becomes ill at school, parents will be contacted to arrange for pick up. The medical room can be used with the permission of a staff member until parental contact is made. In any case of illness or injury, no student is permitted to go home on his/her own initiative but must seek help at the office. **Accidents and emergencies are to be referred to the office immediately.**

Internet Agreement & Social Media Networks

The purpose of the school district network is to facilitate research and education amongst users by providing access to unique resources and the opportunity for collaborative work. Students at ERMS require parent/guardian consent to participate in the use of Internet and digital devices at school. Many students at ERMS have personal computers at home or have access to them elsewhere. More often than we would like, teachers, counsellors, and administration at ERMS are asked to intervene in conflicts between students that began or took on a life of their own "via" internet email or Social Media accounts. Violations of Board Policy 15 — Student Code of Conduct regarding Internet use can include temporary or permanent revocation of access rights to the System, suspension, expulsion or termination, or legal action. We encourage students to make choices to use the social network sites and email services appropriately and to resist the urge to become "cyber-bullies" by speaking unkindly or spreading rumours.

Lockers and Locks

All students will be issued a combination lock and a locker. No personal locks are permitted; locks must be obtained from the school for security reasons. Lock combinations are to be memorized and NOT shared with anyone. A \$11.00 fee is charged to any student who needs a lock replaced because they lost it or shared the combination with another student. Lockers are not to be shared. Graffiti, unacceptable pictures, and writing are not permitted, and a student can be instructed to remove them at any time. Student lockers are the property of the school and are subject to search at any time, with or without notice. Students may only go to their lockers outside of instruction time or outside of the designated times with teacher's permission. To minimize the loss of instructional time, we encourage students to maintain one binder organized by subject.

Learning Services

If you require help with your schoolwork, or have a personal concern, there are several ways to get the support you need. Seek help from your classroom teachers, student services teachers including the counsellor, Youth Care Worker, school administration, or any school staff member.

Lost and Found

Lost clothing, bags, etc. can be claimed from the Lost and Found box under the foyer stairs. Jewelry, purses, wallets, phones, and other smaller items should be turned into the office and can be claimed from the office staff. Unclaimed items are donated to charity at various times during the year after being displayed for students to search.

Office Hours

Office hours are 7:30am – 3:00pm. The school phone number is 604-504-5343. Parents are encouraged to report absences or late arrivals via the SchoolMessenger App.

Parent Advisory Council (PAC)

The PAC is your parent/guardian community at ERMS. We encourage our families to work closely with our school administration and staff to support, encourage, and provide assistance to enhance the quality of education and the well-being of all students at ERMS. Parent Volunteers

Volunteers will be needed for various events and activities throughout the school year. All volunteers must submit an application to volunteer at ERMS and must also have a valid Criminal Record Check (CRC – this is good for 5 years). Planners

Planners will be issued to students this year, and it is expected that students will use them to record homework, important due dates, tests and assessments and so on. Students should bring planners with them to class.

Textbooks

Textbooks, library books, and other educational resources are property of the school and school district. Students are issued textbooks at the beginning of the year. Students are responsible for returning the same textbook they were originally issued upon "textbook checks" and at the end of the year. Students will be charged for lost or damaged textbooks.

Student Telephone

A phone is available for students to use and is in the main lobby entrance of the school. It is only to be used after school or during the day if a teacher has given written permission via either a note on paper or in the student's planner.

Visitors

To help maintain the security of our building and campus and the safety of students, *all visitors* (including parents/guardians) must check in at the main office upon entering the school. Parent/guardians dropping off items (lunches, planners, gym strip, etc.) are asked to leave these items in the office with their child's name. Your child will be paged down to the office during a break to pick the item up.

About our Mascot: The Raven

The raven is a black, glossy bird that is a member of the crow family. The raven is known for its competitiveness, intelligence, mastery, adaptability, and ability to cooperate. We feel many of these qualities are ones Eugene Reimer students should strive to accomplish.



About our School Colours

Our school colours are black, silver, red, and white.

- **BLACK** represents the predominant colour of the North American raven.
- **SILVER** represents the lining of a cloud where a raven flies. The "silver lining" provides comfort, protection, and inspiration for the future.
- **RED** and **WHITE** represent two important ideals:
 - The colours of the Canadian Flag, the flag and country which Eugene Reimer represented so well, winning over 50 national and 22 international medals over his 22-year athletic career.
 - The colours of BC Disability Sports represent perseverance, strength, ability, dedication, and an opportunity to achieve.

Our Namesake: Dr. Eugene Reimer

Our school proudly displays the name of a Canadian hero, Eugene Reimer. Eugene Reimer's story, his commitment to service, unwavering positive attitude, and his passion for enabling others to set goals and realize their potential is a compass for the staff and students at Eugene Reimer Middle School. Eugene Reimer's significant contributions to sports and to athletes with a disability are unparalleled. An inspiration to thousands of disabled individuals, Eugene proved that a wheelchair is not a handicap, but rather, an opportunity for athletic achievement.

Following a childhood bout with polio, the longtime Abbotsford resident was left with only minimal use of his legs. In the 1960s, when wheelchair sports were in their infancy, Eugene took on sports with a passion. He excelled in a wide variety of competitions, including weightlifting, archery, swimming, basketball, volleyball, and track and field events. Eugene Reimer quickly became one of British Columbia's top allaround athletes.

From 1968, until his retirement from sports in 1980, Eugene amassed over 50 national and 22 international medals, including 10 in the Paralympic Games (5 Gold, 4 Silver, 1 Bronze). Eugene was named "Canadian Outstanding Male Athlete of the Year" in 1972, the first time that such a level of recognition had been awarded to an athlete with a disability. In 1974, he was awarded the Order of Canada medal for his "inspiring example to the handicapped". In 1991, the B.C. Sports Hall of Fame and Museum presented Eugene with the W.A.C. Bennett Award, in recognition of his special contribution to the Province of B.C. In 2000, Eugene was inducted into the Terry Fox Hall of Fame (now known as the Canadian Disability Hall of Fame). Later that same year, the Eugene Reimer Award was established. This award is presented annually and recognizes a British Columbian who makes an outstanding contribution in the field of sport, recreation, or physical education for persons with disabilities. Abbotsford's own Eugene Reimer was honoured as the inaugural recipient. On May 2nd, 2002, Eugene Reimer was the first disabled athlete inducted into the B. C. Sports Hall of Fame.

A valued ambassador for people with physical disabilities, he is still celebrated as "a highly distinguished Abbotsford Native whose courage, dedication and many achievements are an excellent model for the youth of our community, and particularly those attending the school that will bear his name." In June 2023, community members joined students and staff at Eugene Reimer Middle School to remember the life and legacy of Eugene Reimer and celebrate the school's 20th anniversary.
